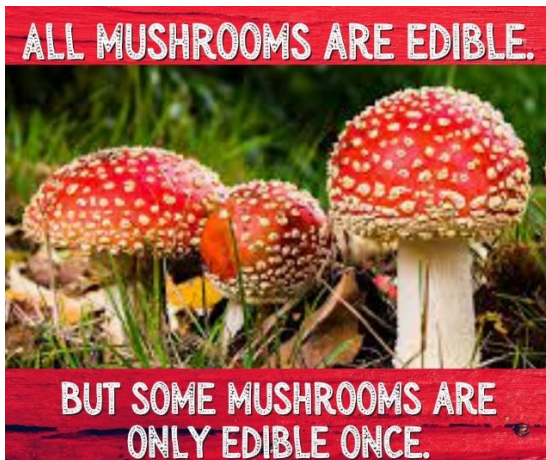

This hymn was composed in 1714 by Isaac Watts at a time of national anxiety concerning who would be next monarch. Queen Anne was nearing the end of her reign. Her 8 children had all died at birth. Her husband had died, and she was disillusioned and lonely.

Her people called her "Good Queen Anne". She had been a moderate Protestant, and generous. She had built many churches. People did not like the prospect of George of Hanover becoming the next king. He spoke no English, and knew nothing of the people.

Isaac Watts wrote this poem to calm the nation's fears. In 1720 the tune we know now was composed in Westminster Abbey.

1 O God, our Help in ages past,
our Hope for years to come,
our Shelter from the stormy blast,
and our eternal Home.

2 Under the shadow of Thy throne
Thy saints have dwelt secure;
sufficient is Thine arm alone,
and our defense is sure

3 Before the hills in order stood,
or earth received its frame,
from everlasting Thou art God,
to endless years the same

4 A thousand ages in Thy sight
are like an evening gone,
short as the watch that ends the night
before the rising sun.

5 Time, like an ever-rolling stream
bears all its sons away;
they fly forgotten, as a dream
dies at the opening day.

6 O God, our Help in ages past,
our Hope for years to come,
be Thou our Guard while life shall last,
and our eternal Home!
